

The mansion was built over two hundred years ago by the Reed family, one of Waldoboro's most prominent families in the 19th century. The Georgian style timber framed home was situated on a small hill overlooking the Medomak River. It was listed on the National Registry of Historic Places. I found a postcard picture of the mansion in my grandmother's papers, so the mansion must have been a source of pride to her. I had the privilege of touring the mansion several years ago and it was a real treat to see the inside of this stately home. The loss of the Reed Mansion is a blow to all who value and enjoy Waldoboro history.

The Reed Mansion: its creator and his family

The Georgian mansion that occupied the hill on Jefferson Street in Waldoboro is no more. The fire alarm that was triggered at 3:30 A.M. on Sunday, April 2, 2017, first involved the town's fire department. It was a difficult fire to fight because of the need to move hoses up the steep hill from the Jefferson source of water and due to the fact that the building's age made it an inferno in a short amount of time. Engine companies from nine surrounding towns responded to aid the **Waldoboro fighters.** By church time on the fateful morning, nothing was left but smoldering remnants of the once showcase home of Waldoboro's Col. Isaac G. Reed and his family.

On April 14, 1808, John R. Cutting, Waldoboro's first Congregational minister, purchased the lot on which the mansion later stood from Ezekiel Barnard. Cutting began to build what came to be known as "Cutting's Folly." The mansion that he planned was too much of an endeavor for a clergyman's salary, and he never finished it. On May 21, 1811, Col. Isaac G. Reed purchased the lot and enlarged the site and the plans for his home.

Born in Littleton, Massachusetts, in 1783 to lawyer Isaac Reed, Sr. and Mary (Gardner) Reed, Isaac G. Reed was a graduate of Harvard's Class of 1803 and studied law with Honorable John Locke of Bellerica before moving to Jefferson and later to Waldoboro to practice his profession. He took up residence in the home of the





beautiful and wealthy Jane (Kinsell) Smouse, widow of Captain George D. Smouse. Reed's law office on Main Street, now the home of a hair stylist business, became a very busy, profitable and power-filled site. Reed's business was sponsored by Squire Jacob Ludwig, first and longtime clerk and justice of the peace for the village. Their business arrangement is described by Dr. Jasper Stahl in his *History of Old Broad Bay and Waldoboro* tome as a "lion-jackal relationship." This working arrangement and his marriage to the wealthy and prestigious widow laid a firm foundation for Reed's ascendancy to that of the town's most powerful politician, a reign that lasted over forty years.





Jane and Isaac moved into the mansion with her three children Gorham, George, and Bertha in April 1816. Six more children were born to the couple: Honorable Isaac, a ship builder and congressman; Mary, wife of John Whipple of Boston; Edward A., Charles, Gardner K, and William G. Dr. Stahl records that "when the plaster was still wet in the construction of the foundation for this home, Reed with a sharp instrument cut the following message into the cement: 'I. G. Reed built this house 1814, 1815, 1816- inhabited it 1816. He wishes health, prosperity and contented minds to all his successors.'"

Reed was a very crafty politician of the Federalist or Tory party. His first public office was that of first selectman, and he proceeded to establish a voting list for the town. Since only landowners were allowed to vote, the list allowed him to consolidate his supporters. He was a member of the local militia and thus merited the title of Colonel which was a title he carried to his grave. He led the town in its Tory position right through to its opposition to Maine's independence and the rise of the Democrat Party. Even though he was a representative to the constitutional convention, he was relegated to the committee to create the State of Maine's Seal. His stepdaughter Bertha is credited with the design which became famous, as it was adopted when in 1820 Maine became a state.

The Reeds entertained many important visitors at the mansion. In 1820, the bow room was added to give space for the reception of Governor John Brooks of Massachusetts, who was the Colonel's guest. Stahl notes that Reed was a believer since college in the "right of the good, the wise, and the rich to govern." He arrived in Waldoboro when in the course of history it was the right time for a man with lofty and far-reaching goals to become its leader. The man who became lawyer, military leader, financier, legislator, town officer, and politician died in 1847 in the mansion that he built for his bride.

Moment in Waldoboro History: The Gay Block Burns

Fifty-five years ago, February 22, 1962, to be exact, the Gay Block, located at the four corners in Waldoboro and which housed Gay's Market and The Waldoboro *Press* plus the Masonic lodge rooms on the upper floor, went up in flames. The inferno was so intense that it scorched the walls of the Fish Building next door, the present home of the Philippe Guillerm Gallery. Barney Castner, manager of the market, is reported to have stated that when he opened the trap door leading to the cellar, flames erupted and he had

time only to grab the cash bag and escape. The Waldoborough Historical Society's February 2017 calendar page shows the Waldoboro Fire Department fighting the blaze and points to the origin as possibly starting in the area of the newspaper which was printed on site.

The Gay Block was erected by John T. Gay on the site of the old Union Block. The Union Block had been built by John Tibbetts and William Fish and fell to fire on June 5, 1900. Today the site provides parking spaces for the gallery shaded by the overgrown Town Christmas Tree evergreen.

Richard Wallace, long-time resident and historian of the town, was an eye witness to the destruction of the building. His mother Edith was driving Richard's sister Judith and her friends Judy Beaucage and Leta Chase up to the village to bowl a few strings to celebrate her daughter's birthday. As Mrs. Wallace neared the village, she realized that Gay's Market was on fire, so she turned around and headed back to Dutch Neck to pick up Richard and his grandmother. Edith drove back Rte. 32, took a right onto Mill Street and then onto Jefferson

Street, drove up the hill to School Street and parked on Main Street. Richard remembers that they walked as far as the Custom House where his father Eben, who had been at work at Storer's Lumber Yard, met them. The date of Richard's sister's birthday will forever be inscribed in his memory as the day Gay's Market burned to the ground!

1779 – 1783 Fort George – "Protected by the Crown"

In 1779, after the Penobscot Expedition ended in disaster for the Colonial Forces, Fort George, in today's Castine, became a safe haven for Loyalists. In 1782, the British reinforced the military presence with so-called Hessians - Braunschweig (Brunswick) and Ansbach-Bayreuth troops. The weekend presentations on September 9 & 10, 2017, will shed light on life at this remote British outpost where Loyalist lived protected by the Crown before a majority of them moved to St. Andrews and St. Stephen as members of the Penobscot Association.



Since there was documented interaction between Broad Bay and Fort George, we hope that many visitors with connection to Waldoboro will come to the event. If some would like to sail up the coast (or down-east) we would be very interested to know how long their journey is, since that is the way they would have traveled in the 1780's.

We have commitments from Braunschweig (Brunswick) reenactors in Germany. Depending on funding there may be as many as seven of them coming to join other Scottish, "Hessian" and British reenactors. This year we focus on the four years of relative peace in the area, when loyalist families moved to be near Fort George thinking that this will be their home for the future.

A library membership is solely for the purpose of allowing distribution of the newsletter to libraries and historical societies and confers no right to vote.

The membership year is July 1 to June 30. This year the newsletter will be issued twice: in April (Winter / Spring) and in October (Summer / Fall).
